From the Pastor's Heart:

Heralds of the Messiah

The messages that we receive from the Gospels seem incredible as we read about miracles, signs and wonders that people experienced during the life of Jesus Christ. Think how incredible it must have seemed to Mary when an angel, sent by God, approached her and told her about this thing that was to happen in her life. She was to give birth to a baby as virgin, a baby who would become King. Mary's encounter with the angel goes beyond our normal human experiences and our knowledge about the natural order of things; we are left with the struggle to believe that such things can actually be possible. The "Event" had no scientific explanation, yet we are told in messages, in both the Old and New Testaments, about events that were to occur in the life of this baby boy, born of a virgin as the Messiah.

The writings of the prophets of the Old Testament that the Jews have been reading for years disclosed intimate details about this Messiah who was to come. Biblical historians say that there is no other ancient source known that gives such an extensive and detailed description of one person's life. The Messiah, who was to be born, was heralded over a thousand year period before his arrival. According to the Apostles' witness; Jesus was recognized as that Messiah. The Apostles declared that everything that had happened in Jesus' life met the qualification of what was predicted many hundreds of years before his birth. The Greek word for Messiah is translated "Christ," or "The Anointed One." The Church has become accustomed to referring to Jesus as the Christ, which was adopted from the Greek terminology.

The prophets were led by God to speak about the birth of Christ; his manner of life, his death, his resurrection, his second coming, and the Kingdom he was to establish. He would change the lives of people and would, in fact, change the world. Starting with Mary, the life of Jesus began to unfold just as it was told by the prophets of the Old Testament. The Angel Gabriel announced to Mary how the birth of Jesus would happen – by the power of the Holy Spirit. He was the promised salvation that people had been waiting to see. He was heralded as Savior of the world. The Early Church of Christ brought people the good news about this new life.

Today, Jesus, the Christ, is still being heralded throughout the world by clergy and lay members of various denominations. Some still find this account of Jesus' life unbelievable, and too incredible to be true, but many have embraced these accounts, written and told by the very people who lived with Jesus until his death. The Apostles were his closest eye-witnesses and they were the ones who would herald the Gospel of the Lord, as the Scripture says, to the ends of the earth. What we have in our possession – the Gospels, the Epistles, and the Writings in the Old Testament are documents that help us to determine the validity of the accounts of the life of Jesus. The Scriptures hinge on the honesty of those ancient people who made the claim that they were moved and led by God to write the accounts which we read today in our Bible. Go to some of the most prestigious theological seminaries in the world, and you will discover that we are looking at the very same texts in their various translations. They are the only canonized texts we have regarding the testimony of the Apostles who wrote the New Testament. Who is better qualified to bear witness to the truth than the very people who have seen, heard, and have experienced life with Jesus? Not only have they seen and touched him, they spent days, weeks, months, and even years traveling, conversing, debating, crying, and no doubt, at times, laughing with the Lord. They slept and ate with him, at times under the open night sky, and perhaps enjoying their evening meals roasting over a camp fire. They saw him suffer and die; they also saw him come back to life. We have no better witnesses then those people whom the Lord himself had called to herald the coming of his kingdom.

Though we commemorate and celebrate Jesus' first coming, there is yet an expectation of his second coming which we refer to as the Second Advent. Every church and denomination is anticipating a Second Advent - A second coming of Christ. We continue to herald the coming of the Messiah, Jesus, the Christ, and, I am sure, the angels will continue to rejoice and sing his praises until his arrival. Amen.

ECUMENICAL COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS FOR NOVEMBER

Planning is underway for the annual distribution of Christmas boxes.

Grace Pantry has a lot to report:

We have received grants and contributions from the Carpenter Foundation, the Price Chopper Foundation and the Adirondack Bank, Community Bank and the Bergamini Family totaling over \$3,525. If you patronize these two banks and Price Chopper, please be sure to thank them personally.

Kinney has donated some personal items, plus a case of much needed plastic bags.

The Unitarian Universalist Community ran a diaper drive in September, and has contributed 65 diaper packs to the Pantry, enough for one month's distribution.

We're looking for monthly sponsorships!

The Adirondack Alliance sponsored the Pantry in September, and St. Luke's and the UUs are on board for April and May. One month's support is about \$500.

CROP Walk - this year's CROP Walk was quite successful! We raised over \$5,100 and had 44 walkers. Half of the money raised is used to alleviate hunger here in Saranac Lake.

Salvation Army Kettle Collections: The Salvation Army raises about \$3,000 a year during its winter kettle campaign outside the SL Post Office. 90% of this money stays in the community and is distributed to those in need in the form of food, heating and electricity vouchers. The Ecumenical Council would like to put out the word that more "ringers" are needed; perhaps we can expand to an additional location.

Many thanks to Cathy Moore who has been handling the distribution of the vouchers for years. The EC is considering how to assume responsibility for the vouchers.

Homeless Shelter: Contributions continue to flow in. We're optimistic and enthusiastic about providing a solution to this problem of homelessness in our area. Contributions are always welcome.
