From the Pastor's Heart: The Greatest Biblical Theme: Love

Love is the greatest theme that dominates all of the biblical stories and teachings of the Scripture. To be sure, the Bible is about God in relation to His people. This relationship of God with His people is defined by God's very nature – love. The Apostle John in his epistle to the Church declares that "God is love." In other words, John suggests that God is the embodiment of what love is. This love of God has been expressed in many ways. But, the greatest expressing of God's love came by way of Jesus Christ through word and deed. Jesus reflected the true nature of the Father as he so well explained to Phillip and the other disciples during the Passover feast. It was love that compelled Jesus to accept his fate on the cross because it was the Father's will for him to do so for the world. "No greater love can be expressed than for a person to lay down his life for his friends," Jesus exclaimed. Love is poised to make sacrifices for the beloved. This is how we know that we are loved by God, or by anyone else. Love is willing to suspend self-serving for the moment in order to give of itself to bring wholeness and wellbeing to another. This is precisely what we see in Jesus' story about the Good Samaritan. I have decided to take the liberty to insert this story line of Jesus in this article so it may help reinforce what this article intends to bring across about this godly kind of love. Here is how Jesus responded to one of the experts of the Mosaic Law who by pretense wanted to know the depth of Jesus' knowledge:

On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?" He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with your entire mind'; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live?" But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii (money) and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.' "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise." Luke 10:25-37

We are capable of loving. But, there are some conditions that require all we can muster from our being to succeed in sharing our love. For example, dying on the cross was the ultimate love test of our Lord, especially because he was without wrong toward God or any person. Though he was aware of the betrayal, and having been abandoned and denied by his disciples, and the conspiracy that the religious leaders had formed against him; yet, on the cross he forgave them all. This act of Jesus tells us that love is simply an act of grace. It is a choice of free-giving. It does not seek to be compensated or desire retribution for wrong treatment. We may never be able to love at the level that God loves us. But, we do and are expected to grow in love. We may spend the rest of our lives learning how to love. Thank God for His love and grace that He has shown and imparted to us, to aid us in our effort to share our love.

FUEL FUND

There is good news on this front. Our overall fuel cost through the end of February was down by 26% The bad news is that despite moving worship services to the Fellowship Hall, we used 405 more gallons of heating oil than in 2014. Part of this is due to the extreme cold weather we have had so far this year. We have been saved by a 40% decrease in the cost of heating oil!! Contributions to the Fuel Fund have helped to reduce the strain on the budget even further. To contribute to the fuel fund, envelopes are made available in the pews or just write Fuel Fund on your check in the memo line and place it in the offering place. Prayerfully consider how you can help and whatever the amount, do it with love and remember, "God Loves a Cheerful Giver!".

- Mitchel Smith reported our pledge income is down from last year at this time; use donations remain good; no ministry shares have been paid to date; fuel expense is the only thing out of the ordinary; memorial donations for Lucille Wilson have been received.
- Marilyn Gillespie reported that the legal work to complete the merger with Bloomingdale still has to be completed. The council voted to approve a change in the use donations for the Fellowship Hall as follows: For 1-5 people \$5, for 6-14 people \$20 and for 15-30 people \$1.50 per person.

The March meeting was held on April 12. Catherine Moore spoke on the needs of the Salvation Army., giving an idea of the extension work they do. The Red Kettle Campaign did not do as well this year as in previous years. The group also reviewed their mission planning.
